The Story Behind Be Thou My Vision

"Be Thou My Vision" is an 8th century Irish hymn that was translated by Eleanor Hull in 1912. Today the hymn is sung to the Irish folk tune "Slane". This song is rooted in medieval Celtic Christianity and the words are based on a poem often attributed to the sixth-century Irish Christian poet, Dallán Forgaill, also known as Saint Dallán. His given name was Eochaidh mac Colla, and he earned the nickname, "Dallán" (meaning "little blind one") after losing his sight, reputedly as a result of extensive studying. The "Amhra Coluim Cille", a panegyric on Columba, is his best known work and considered "one of the most important poems we have from the early medieval Gaelic world". It is reported that after completing the work, Saint Dallán regained his sight.



Updates to Hospital Visitation and Faith Census Access for Clergy

As of August 1st, the Cleveland Clinic will no longer allow clergy access to patient faith census data. This change is to align with the overall system's protocols. This means that you will need to tell the office if you are planning to be in the hospital, are in the hospital, know someone in the hospital, have heard through the grapevine that someone is in the hospital. Your pastors want to support you with prayer and encouragement if you are hospitalized, but we can only do this if we know someone is there. Thank you for your help!



Mission

An update from our sister Church in Cabaiguan, Cuba*

"In Cuba, the situation is increasingly complex, since we cannot recover money earned from tourism our economy is very precarious. In Cabaiguán it is a little better than in larger cities, since at least agricultural products, although they are very expensive, can be found in the outdoor markets. In bigger cities, many times, even if you have enough money, you can't find what you need. As for the rest of the products, there is a little more supply, although as I told you months ago, most people do not have access to those products, because you have to buy them directly with US dollars. However, people buy dollars at more than 3 times their official value on the black market and access this market to the that it is possible, to be able to guarantee, above all, toiletries that do not exist anywhere else. This will no longer be possible as of next Monday, since Cuban banks will not be able to receive more dollars in cash. If you came, for example, you would have to come with euros, because the dollar will no longer be accepted by Cuban banks.



[Pastor Irrarragorry notes that the recent Presidential decrees and subsequent lack of review in labelling Cuba as a country that is "sponsoring terrorism" have adversely impacted the church and its community in their ability to use hard currency for basic goods. Most basic goods can only be purchased in Cuban currency (CUC's).]

As for COVID, the situation is very complex both in the country and in Cabaiguán. Records of daily infections are not available and we have some mutations of the virus that are very lethal and more infectious than the original. Fortunately, 1/4 of the population has already been vaccinated and progress is being made in vaccinating the entire population over 19 years of age.

In church we are forbidden to meet, but on Sundays we meet in small groups and although we cannot sing or do other things that give us away, we reflect on the word and pray. Last month they raised the church's electricity rate even more and now it is more than double from the previous rate which was five times more than that of last year's. In other words, today the current rate is 10 times more expensive than last year.

At the moment we cannot do anything about the COVID situation, but we are planning to develop a gym to improve the economy of the church. There are many expectations, but we will have to wait for the conditions of the virus to improve and hopefully restrictions will cease."

"I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world." John 16:33

Though we cannot financially give at this time, please pray for our sister Presbyterian Church in Cabaiguan, Cuba as they are suffering not only from COVID but from the political decisions of vying governments.

Justice and Honor

Several members of the Justice and Honor Task Force attended the unveiling of the historic marker commemorating the Gifford School/Hosie Shumann Park on June 19th, 2021. Gifford Elementary School was first located at the park in 1901, and Gifford High School was established there in 1937.

In attendance at the event was Anna Lee Reagans, age 100, the oldest known graduate of Gifford High School, as well as many other former graduates. Also in attendance were many commissioners of the Indian River County Commission, IRCSD Superintendent David Moore, Assistant Superintendent Eric Seymour and many more community leaders.

The event was presided over by Mrs. Jonnie Mae Perry, CEO of the Gifford Historical Museum & Cultural Center. (Jonnie Mae is also a member of our J and H Task Force). In addition, "Juneteenth", also known as Emancipation Day, Freedom Day, or Jubilee Day was celebrated after the unveiling of the marker. This day is celebrated to commemorate June 19, 1865, the day that tens of thousands of enslaved people of color in Texas first learned that they were free. It was the official end to Slavery in the United States.



Profile of a Presbyterian Woman: Patsy E. Helseth

Patsy Helseth is the oldest living Charter Member of First Presbyterian Church! (We have two more living charter members as well- Mr. John Schumann and Mr. Harry Offutt.) Patsy was born in Eye, Suffolk County, England. She came to the US in 1946 after WWII. She met her future husband, Phillip Helseth, during the war. He asked her to come to the States and become his wife! Patsy flew 22 hours from England to New York City. She landed in Shannon, Ireland, for lunch, and then flew to Newfoundland for dinner! Phillip and his parents met her at the airport in NYC. Patsy laughed when she told me that her parents gave her a paid return ticket in case she changed her mind!

Patsy and Phillip were married in Vero Beach. It took a lot of courage and strength for a young woman to come to a new country, only knowing her future husband. Her parents gave her the freedom to make her choice, even though they would miss her greatly. They knew it would take England many years to recover from the War. It was hard for Patsy's parents, and also hard for Patsy, since she did not really know anyone locally.

The Helseth family had been in the citrus grove business since 1895. Patsy and Phillip had one son, Phillip Jr., and he has 2 daughters. Her husband, Phillip, passed away in 2005. Her sister, Jill, still lives in England and they speak on the phone every Saturday!

Patsy and Phillip were among the group of 75 people from the Community Church that formed First Presbyterian Church in 1954. She was the first Deaconess, and then one of two women first elected Elders. She has been Moderator of Presbyterian Women three times, and has held many positions in the Sunday School. Her hobbies are gardening, reading, and knitting. She loves to socialize with old friends. She visits England every other year to see her sister and her family.


The Helseth family donated a stained glass window in memory of her husband's brother, Albert O. Helseth, who was killed in WWII. Patsy, Phillip, and his mother donated the Carillon Bells in memory of Phillip's father. The Carillon Bells are the beautiful chimes that are played at different times of the day.

Her favorite Bible verses are Ecclesiastes 3:1-8 and 1 Corinthians 13:4-8. *"Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. Love never fails. But where there are prophecies, they will cease; where there are tongues, they will be stilled; where there is knowledge, it will pass away."*

The Men's Fellowship Breakfast is held at CJ Cannon's every Tuesday morning from 7:30AM to 9:00AM. We are always looking for men in our church and their friends to join us for some rewarding discussion and informative speakers. This is a great venue to get to know some great men in our congregation and make new friends.

We support local charitable groups in Indian River and Brevard counties such as Florida Sheriff's Youth Ranch, FPC Orchestra, Camp Haven, Missionary Flight, Indian River State College outreach (Elsie Montabalm), and Salt of the Earth Ministries among others.

One of the charitable groups we support is the *Space Coast Honor Flight* led by a member of our own congregation- Rear Admiral Jim Hart. Admiral Hart is tasked with directing a group of some 100+ volunteers and board members in the organization. FPC has 21 individuals involved with this organization. We also have members who volunteer their time to assist the *Honor Flight* veterans with the trip, which includes an orientation the Sunday before, then a very early Saturday flight to DC, tour of the memorials, and a late flight and welcome home that same night. The entire round trip lasts only 13 hours! The Honor Flight was postponed during the pandemic, but now will be flying once again this coming September 11th. 

England in Gas Masks

The day I left England for the U.S.A.
Mother and Dad behind us

Could a housewife today feed a family of four on three pounds of meat per week? Could she serve them a wholesome breakfast if only allowed four eggs per month? Could a mother laughingly remind her children not to forget their gas masks as they boarded the school bus each morning and could YOU take your blanket and pillow and sleep in a cellar or subway each night for months at a time? Yes, it's hard to believe that such times did exist, but my teenage years were spent under such circumstances. I will never forget that Sunday in September 1939 when our Minister in the midst of his sermon received the message that England was at war. What a vivid memory I have of my father and the neighborhood men busily digging a trench in our garden that afternoon, soon to be replaced by an air-raid shelter, big enough for several families to climb into, for it was obvious that civilians would inescapably be on the front line and so the Battle of Britain began. My sister and I were hysterical with laughter when we tried on the gas masks we all had been issued. We were always being drilled at school as to how and when to use them. Even babies had them. Soon, the shops were featuring exotic looking cases in which to carry them. I had one for school and one for dress occasions! We carried them with us always and were constantly checked by the police.

Soon, our family of four increased to eight! The children were being evacuated from London and the bombings. Our little country town was a receiving center. We were given children to care for according to the size of one's home. Of course the children were dreadfully homesick and there were many problems, especially when busloads of Mums and Dads at weekends would descend on the town to visit their youngsters. It was hard on everyone. All sorts of volunteer groups were organized. The "fire-watch" was one of them when men and women took turns in the clock tower of the town hall to watch for enemy planes who might drop incendiary bombs on our precious wheat fields. There was a youth service for teenagers and a Junior Air Training Corps and of course Special Constables for which my father volunteered. His special duty was to go to the church tower and ring the bells which would be a warning to the townspeople that we had been invaded by the enemy. We listened to Winston Churchill on the radio in those days. His speeches encouraged and helped us all to keep fighting - he was a wonderful war leader. Where would England have been without him? When he announced that we would fight the enemy on our shores, in our towns, on our streets, in our country lanes - yes, even in our homes - we really believed we could! Soon the London Blitz slowed down and the evacuees started returning to their homes. The tide had turned and America was now fighting with us.

Within a year and within a radius of thirty miles around our small town, six American airbases were built. Yes, we had been invaded, but fortunately it was only by the Americans! Austere conditions were still with us but we did not have to carry our gas masks now and there was an air of gaiety and expectancy rather than one of dread. I believe that the spirit of the British people and the love of their country in those difficult times could be an incentive and inspiration for this modern world today. And if you asked an Englishman how he endured those hardships and tribulations he would most probably quote the famous British Admiral, Lord Nelson, who at the Battle of Trafalgar said "England, this day, expects every man to do his duty."
